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Chairman Jaskiewicz opened the public hearing and asked if there were anyone from the public who would like to speak regarding the General Government Budget.

Bob Manfredi, 9 Heather Brook Road, Uncasville, questioned the need for a \$1.57 million anaerobic digester, which is used to break down organic matter to produce biogas for electricity and bio-fertilizer for farmlands, by the WPCA (Water Pollution Control Authority). He also questions the High School's Water Plan, citing a recent article in *The Day* newspaper, which states that, if approved, a \$480,000.00 project to connect a new well to their current system would be instituted rather than a previously proposed \$50,000.00 project from the Southeast Connecticut Water Authority to route the water from some of their wells to the system. He also questioned the reasoning behind the approximately 20 (twenty) police sedans parked at the Public Safety Building and recommended selling the vehicles and purchasing police SUV's with those funds. He further questioned the need for a canine police dog, which are readily available through the State Police. Eliminating the dog would, he estimates, save the Town approximately \$150,000.00/year. He also noted the additional \$200,000.00 that is being proposed for Public Safety, which equates to two (2) officers and increases the number of total officers on the force to 28.

Howard R. Beetham, Jr., 60 Riverview Road, Uncasville, spoke in opposition of the estimated mil rate increase of 1.54, as proposed in the Mayor's budget, and requested a zero mil increase. Approximately 40% of the homeowners in the Town are senior citizens who have received less than 1/10th of 1% increase in their social security benefits over the last three years. He also noted the over \$2 million in back taxes that is owed by individuals who lack the funds. In addition, he agreed with Mr. Manfredi regarding the need to eliminate the old police cruisers, which have an average age nine years old, with newer vehicles for the safety of the officers and public. He questioned the Board of Education budget and the need for a teacher teaching classes with only 9 to 11 children/class.

Gary Murphy, Chief, Oakdale Fire Company, spoke with regards to the removal of the \$300,000.00 - \$325,000.00 Tanker Truck for the Fire Company on the Town's Capital Plan. The Tanker Truck would replace their current Pumper Truck, which was purchased in 1995, and, though it has served them very well, has reached the end of its life. Currently, the Fire Company houses the only Tanker Truck in the Town and the Company would like to have two such vehicles to help them ensure that sufficient water is provided during emergency situations and eliminate the need to rely on the resources of their neighboring towns. The purchasing of a new Truck has been delayed for three to four years and, due to the age and condition of the current Truck, it will need to be placed out of service should a new Truck not be approved. He urged the Town Council to reconsider the decision for the safety of the firefighters and public.

Chairman Jaskiewicz asked three times if there were any additional persons from the public who would like to speak regarding the General Government Budget. There being none, the Public Hearing was closed.

5. Adjournment

The meeting adjourned at 6:12 p.m.
