Presentation: B) Readers Workshop; Mohegan Elementary School – Principal Will Klinefelter

Principal Klinefelter and Mrs. Zablonski reported on the Readers Workshop initiative in the district. The district moved to Eureka Math a few years ago but the reading scores remained stagnant which led us to examine our reading program hopes of in improving comprehension. A committee was formed to look at different reading program options. The committee ultimately chose to pilot Teachers College Reading Workshop program. This program required the development of book rooms at each elementary school with a large number of books. The number of books required is great because the idea is to offer books at every reading level and a broad range of subjects to ensure the students have multiple choices which are of interest to them. The books are organized by reading level and entered into a database to allow for tracking by barcode system. The element of student choice makes a huge difference for the students, they are excited to read because they choose the books. We had a fifth grade student, previously a reluctant reader, point out symbolism in a book, it was so refreshing to see this level of excitement from a student who was previously intimidated by reading. Maggie Roberts has spent time at each school modeling lessons for the staff. Students are assessed three to four times per year in fluency, comprehension and ongoing analysis. One grade level has already seen a 20% increase to their reading levels.

The most recent event that affects about 1/4th of the student body at Montville High were the SATs. Today, the junior class took the SATs and I believe with all the effort and studying that the teachers and students have been showing in the past few months, a majority of the class did well on the SATs. Most juniors have been studying for a couple of months and even during their spring break. Other than studying for SATs over spring break, many students had become aware of the events occurring within our school system. These events were brought to light for not only the students but also many parents. How the student body is coping with these events is varying. Students' opinions have been significantly different but I think one of the major concerns is how the school system is being seen by the rest of the world. The students should focus on achieving great things and reestablishing the name and pride of the school system. In order to do this, the students need to understand that they can talk to an adult in the school system about any issue that they have witnessed or been a part of. It's important for the faculty also, to make the students comfortable with telling them anything and assuring that the students reach their full potential. Another concern for the students is the effect that the changes of administration would have on their school lives. I think the easiest way to overcome this concern is simply time. With time, the students will become more accustomed to any changes and to the new administrators. Our school system should stand together and stand as one to insure the strength of our schools.

This school year:

- Greg Clark represented MHS at the national level for indoor track.
- Alexis DeLucia was selected to attend nationals for lacrosse.
- I had the honor of being the second MHS student in three years to qualify for the All-National Honor Choir.
- Holly Richmond submitted an application to workshop her original play at two different festivals.
- Various sports and music programs have sent students to state-level competitions and festivals.
- The cheerleading team placed fourth-best in all of New England.
- Students planned a blood drive that yielded 17 pints of blood despite a power outage that sent them home early.
- Students demonstrated civic engagement at an unprecedented level, engaging in discussions about policy and the future of the world.

• The choir program won seven awards at a festival in Annapolis, Maryland, including the top choir score for the festival.

This August, Montville High School is sending one student to MIT, another to the University of Pennsylvania, another to Yale, and yet another to Harvard. Many students will be attending other postsecondary institutions as well, ranging from the University of Connecticut to Clemson University.

There is no shortage of positive activity occurring at Montville High School at any given time. There are many good teachers and mentors, and there are many students doing their best to make our nation and the world a better place.

So while it is important to correct errors and inform the public about the negative parts of our schools, we must always remember that there are many wonderful people doing their best every day at Montville High School. We cannot ignore the good and focus only on the bad when the good is so plentiful. Let the good carry us into the future and the bad be defeated by the tradition of justice. Item 9. Superintendent's Report.

a. Report from Director of Special Services – Mrs. Paula LaChance

We continue to have movement within the Special education department. As you know it is very fluid with new students coming into district and others moving within the district to special programs. To that end we have had several new students enroll which has taken me into the schools to observe, consult and work with staff and families. This month I also conducted observations of our intern students working at Mohegan Sun through our Transition Program. It is wonderful to see the progress these students have made since the beginning of the year. We have one student that will be graduating and will be offered a permanent position at Mohegan Sun.

Other tasks I have focused on this month include Handle with Care Training. We held a training in April and will have another one on May 11 during Professional Development. I also interviewed for district wide substitute nurses this month and have offered a position to one candidate. This will give us a total of three substitutes to cover should the need arise.

Last but certainly not least I continue to work on programming and staffing for ESY.

b. Report from the Assistant Superintendent – Mrs. Pallin

I met with the staff at Tyl Middle School and both the staff and students at Montville High School on Monday. I have set up mandated reporter training which is required for all active employees including substitute teachers, as a refresher. This training must be completed before Friday and staff will not be eligible to work beyond Friday if it has not been completed. Substitutes throughout the district are required to complete the training. Administrator's will have school climate training and mandated reported training with legal counsel. The water project continues to move forward, the tank has been approved and the pipeline drawings came in on Friday and are currently being reviewed. The high school took the SAT's today and the A.P. exams begin next week.

I have receive an overwhelming number of emails from parents, teachers, students and the community members as well as offers of support from area districts, the State Department and former superintendents.

I have been a substitute in Montville for twelve years, most recently a tutor. I am very proud of our schools. I have been working mostly in elementary schools. I would like to reassure parents that Montville substitutes are your neighbors. We are articulate, caring people who put the needs of the students above everything else. The first thing that I do when I enter a room is to ensure that I have the key to lock the door from the inside, I look for the corner where we will hide if we have a lockdown drill, and I also am aware of where the fire evacuation route is. In Montville, lesson plans are always provided. The teachers work together, they take care of each other, whether you are an associate, a principal an assistant superintendent, even the board. The board was welcoming. Not taking political sides, this is a human side. When your students are put on a bus and sent to school, rest assured these teachers care about your children. It is cool to live in the community where you work. Montville is a great community. I have to be honest I would lay down my life for your children if I had to. This is personal, the media has sensationalized us, I am not going to use those terms and feed into it. I never thought when I graduated college \$60,000 in debt that I would be a substitute teacher but it has

allowed me to stay at home with my kids and I can't imagine ever doing anything else. I want to say thank you to the board. Laurie, you have done such a great job. I am a Montville substitute teacher and I am really proud.

I have had a great experience at Murphy, we have a great principal. You mentioned the out of town students and the revenue, is there any way to move that money from the general funds to the schools? Murphy struggles financially, having no field trips takes away from students. You discussed the mandated reporter training, this training will not help with a lack of common sense.

I respectfully submit this letter of support for Mr. Jeffrey Theodoss. I will not comment on the events that occurred in the fall, as I did not witness them personally, therefore it would be inappropriate for me to comment. I will, however, tell you about my personal interactions and communications with Mr. Theodoss.

I have gotten to know Mr. Theodoss in both a personal and professional manner over the last five years that my two children have attended Montville High School. I have served on the Governance Board for the last three years over which Mr. Theodoss presides. I grew to admire him greatly over the course of my time on the Board, both personally and professionally. Many times I came home and asked my daughters if they

were aware of just how lucky they were to have a principal who cared so passionately about ALL of the students at MHS. They shared my belief that Mr. Theodoss is handsdown one of the best school administrators that the school had ever had.

Mr. Theodoss is a kind and gentle leader and sets an example for both students and faculty to emulate. I admire the way that he would speak in the Board meetings about how he wanted to make sure that the school reached all of the student body to enable and facilitate their becoming not only the best student that they could be, but also the best person that they could be. He was acutely aware that not every student was an academic scholar, but he continually asked us, "What can we do for the kids to prepare them for life as an adult and to help them to become a productive member of society?" It was important to him that the courses offered at Montville High would benefit ALL types of students. Advanced Placement and ECE classes were just as important, in his eyes, as the computer, technology and cooking classes. He wanted the education that the students received at MHS to be topnotch. I firmly believe that he has succeeded.

As a Montville High School graduate myself, I can tell you that I received an excellent education that has allowed me to have a career that allows me to support my family and contribute to society in a positive way. But, the education that both of my children have received under the leadership of Mr. Theodoss has far exceeded my own education and has allowed for both of them to enroll in college feeling prepared and ready for success. Chase served all of his punishments. Our son has to have an escort to the restroom until further notice per Mr. Orbe. Mr. Orbe told us athletes are held to a higher standard. We have faith in the Board.

If you are not reading Facebook, you should be. My son was bullied at Tyl and it was swept under the rug by Mr. Levesque, Mrs. Dix and Will Klinefelter. I had to have heavy proof before Mrs. Dix would take it seriously. At MHS, my son was tormented by a substitute. He was called in by Mrs. Patten and my son got an in school suspension, the teacher lied and he offered proof. Why wasn't I called? My son offered proof from every student which was in the classroom, when he asked Mrs. Patten if he could use that proof Mrs. Patten said no, we support our staff not our students. When I spoke with Mr. Theodoss, he said it was no longer an issue because the regular teacher is back on Monday. I am glad they are gone and I hope they do not return. There other people in administrative positions who do not deserve their jobs. They did nothing for the students. They took my daughter's phone. My kids should feel safe. I should not have to call the school every day.

The comments from students were excellent. It seems the transparency issue is serious, maybe there should be training on transparency because small issues could blow up and become larger issues. I am not sure of the screening process for substitute teachers, they often don't reflect the quality of the teacher they are replacing. How do we ensure subs do?

Here on behalf of my daughter. At the beginning of the school year my daughter witnessed drugs sold in MHS. We spoke with Mrs. Patten, evidence was on camera and she was told the date, the time and the day. The parent of the student was not told and I was not even advised that my child had reported this. Mrs. Patten did absolutely nothing. My daughter went to an administrator the day before vacation and advised an administrator again, and again the parent was not advised. Right now everything is blown up way out of proportion, and THIS does require an investigation.
